





The Vasa Museum shop has something special for all visitors – young and old – all of which relate to Vasa and life in the 1600s. Many of the products are exclusive to the Vasa Museum, such as replicas of objects found on board the ship. The shop can be found on the entrance level next to the exit and is open to everyone, not just museum visitors.

Restaurant & cafe

The Vasa Museum restaurant serves traditional Swedish dishes, coffee, cinnamon rolls, sandwiches and baked goods. Swedish meatballs with cream sauce and lingonberries are always on the menu, along with soup, salad and vegetarian options. The restaurant is on the entrance level next to Vasa's stern.

Toilets

Toilets and baby changing rooms are available at the entrance, by the Information Desk and on floor 3.

Accessibility

Wheelchairs may be borrowed from the Information Desk. The auditorium is equipped with a hearing loop. There is a model available of Vasa for visually impaired visitors. The model allows you to feel with your hands to discover how Vasa was built. If you are interested, contact the Information Desk.

The warship Vasa sank on its maiden voyage in Stockholm on 10 August, 1628. After 333 years on the seabed, the mighty ship was salvaged, and its voyage continued. Today, Vasa is the world's best-preserved 17th century ship, magnificently adorned with hundreds of carved sculptures and 98% original.

Plan your visit


We recommend that you watch the short film about Vasa and join a guided tour around the ship. Information on times for the film and the tours can be found at the Information Desk on floor 4, the entrance level. Audio guides are available in different languages.

All around the ship, there are exhibitions that tell the story of Vasa's history – and what the artefacts, sources and research can tell us about the ship, people and society in early 17th

century Sweden. The order you visit the different exhibitions is for you to decide. All exhibitions have information in Swedish and English.
